EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

Emergency Preparedness Kit: Include Flashlight and extra batteries, Whistle, Battery-powered Radio, Plastic Sheeting and Duct Tape for sheltering-in-place verses evacuation. Extra clothing and blanket, Hand sanitizer, toilet paper, Matches in waterproof container. Personal hygiene items, including a toothbrush, toothpaste, comb, brush, soap, contact lens supplies, and feminine supplies, Plastic garbage bags, ties (for personal sanitation uses) **Food** 3 days worth of non-perishable food per person and can opener. **Water** Three gallons per person **Medications** Include non-prescription medications, including pain relievers, stomach remedies, etc. Prescription medications, keep at least three-day's supply and don't forget extra hearing aid batteries and glasses. **First Aid Supplies:** Absorbent Compress 5x9 Dressing, Adhesive Bandages (Assorted Sizes), Adhesive Cloth Tape 5 yds/1", Sterile Gauze Pads 3x3, Antibiotic Ointment Packets (approx. 1g), Antiseptic Wipe Packets, Packets of Aspirin (162mg), Pair of Non-Latex Gloves (Size Large), Scissors

Use an Evacuation Box: Put important papers into sealed, waterproof plastic bags in a easy to carry box. Include:

Map, Traveler's checks or cash and a few rolls of quarters. Negatives or CD of irreplaceable personal photographs. A list of emergency contacts that includes doctors, financial advisors, clergy, reputable repair contractors, and family members who live outside your area. Copies of prescriptions for medicines and eyeglasses, children's immunization records. Health, dental, or prescription insurance cards or information.

Copies of your auto, flood, renter's, or homeowners insurance policies (or at least policy numbers) and a list of insurance company telephone numbers. Backups of computerized financial records. Safe deposit box key. A list of bank account, loan, credit card, driver's license, investment account (brokerage and mutual funds), and Social Security numbers.

Copies of important financial and family records. Include: deeds, titles, wills, birth and marriage certificates, passports, relevant employee benefits documents, first 2 pages of the previous year's federal and state income tax, Originals, *other than wills*, keep in a safe deposit box or at another location.

The core reason the Pennies for Poverty Program exists is to lessen the current effects of poverty and crisis, while working simultaneously to eliminate the root causes of poverty and crisis in the future. *We do not provide direct service to individuals in need.*

Pennies for Poverty: 2 Cents 4 Change, Inc. consists of 4 programs:

- 2 Cents 4 Change - we are asking everyone to donate 2 cents a day or \$7.30 a year which 100% is given out in grants to fund new initiatives or under funded current programs that lift people out of poverty. The grants are available to service agencies or individuals who have new ideas or project that helps people in need.
- 2 Cans 4 Change - asking everyone to give 2 cans a month to the local food pantries.
- 2 Hours 4 Change - asking everyone to volunteer 2 hours a month to an organization of your choice.
- TOGETHER 4 Change - monthly events which are free to the community in order to increase and strengthen the community and raise awareness.

Pennies for Poverty: 2 Cents 4 Change is run by volunteers of the community; funded by the community; and for the benefit of the community.
